Imagine Austin Comprehensive Plan Underway

nstead of having a citizen base like the 1970's Austin Tomorrow Plan or the 1989 AustinPlan, this time the Council hired a consultant to create Imagine Austin and a thirty-four member Citizen Advisory Task Force (CATF) has been picked by Council to represent all of us.

CATF meets monthly to receive staff briefings on different elements of the planning process at One Texas Center, no microphones, no minutes and no TV coverage! However, City staff has held an innovative variety of public sessions to gain citizen participation. The first two meetings focused on the problems Austin is now facing. Individuals walked from panel to panel, left dots and notes to indicate their concerns. Next came the "Meeting in a Box" series, conducted by volunteers under City guidelines, in small groups in homes, libraries, restaurants, etc. Subsequent sessions were conducted in many neighborhoods throughout the City. Participants were grouped around tables, each with a large map of the metropolitan area. Groups negotiated to "create" a plan by choosing symbols to stick on the map indicating preferred densities, land use, transportation choices, etc.

These public input efforts have most recently culminated in five different future development scenarios for the Austin metropolitan area. Once again, sessions were held all over the City in September and October, and citizens were asked to vote for their preferred scenario. Norwood House Update

hirty months after some SRCC members volunteered to form the Norwood Posse

and to do something about the run-down Norwood House, located at Riverside and IH 35, the adventure has a new L twist. This summer, a new Assistant Director, Kelly Snook, came to PARD (the City's Parks and Recreation Department) to head up, among other responsibilities, the Planning, Design & Construction Division. Kelly spared no time in forming a direction for the Norwood property, reversing PARD's 25-year long "policy" of deterioration by neglect.

Ms. Snook determined that the Norwood House and property are a hot political button -- the Posse can probably credit itself with raising the property to this level. She also determined that PARD needed a Feasibility Study by outside professionals who had no vested interest in the property, to evaluate various options for the entire property (not just the House), to assist PARD in making a recommendation to City Council about exactly what to do with the property. The options for the House were loosely described to the Posse as demolition, complete restoration, and some sort of repurposing that might use part of the House structure.

It is unfortunate that the Posse had to contact PARD about this new direction, as apparently no one told Ms. Snook about the Posse or about all the work the Posse had already done. Since learning about the Posse, however, members have had several meetings with PARD, the last one including the principals of CasaBella, the architectural firm being considered for the Feasibility Study. Posse members have shared their research and findings, which are considerable. (continued p 3)

Imagine Austin Continued . . .

Even with the heroic efforts by staff, individual participation has been low. The problems connected with doing a plan are many. To involve ordinary people with busy lives in a planning process, even when it concerns their own neighborhood, is difficult. After all it took three years for SRCC residents to create a plan and develop a consensus, committee meeting by committee meeting; EROC went through the same experience. We had to learn what our options were within the zoning regulations and decide what we wanted to preserve and/or change. We had maps that showed each house, church and commercial enterprise.

For *Imagine Austin* we are shown four land use colors and major transportation lines and one to five activity (growth) centers. With so little detail at that scale, more questions are generated than the proposals can possibly answer. Detail and transparency in the scenarios are lacking as is an all important understanding as to how the City will control development outside the City limits. Will we expand the City limits to Capitol of Texas Highway on the west and 130 on the east?.

Staff has assured us that adopted neighborhood plans will be preserved. The Austin Neighborhoods Council (ANC), in a rare move, passed a Resoltuion to stop this comprehensive planning process until a number of issues/questions has been addressed and resolved – starting with analyzing all of the adopted neighbhorhood plans to see how much future planning is already in place. SRCC, along with other members of ANC, has been asked to pass a similar resoltuion. The Executive Committee decided on October 18th to prepare a statement expressing SRCC's concern about the potentially huge impacts *Imagine Austin* could have on us, based on the information available . . . and even more so, not available!

In Scenario D, which is closest to the Austin Tomorrow Plan, light rail snakes along Riverside Drive from IH35 to Congress Avenue. Where will the right-of-way come from? If we could see more, we could ask more and make better decisions. And when oh when will we ever see a summation of all those sticky notes?

Norwood House Continued . . .

The Posse has been assured they will be able to review and comment on the contract between the City and the consultants, and that Posse members will be involved as the Study progresses.

At this point, Posse members are awaiting their opportunity to look at the contract. The City's characteristic slow progress makes some members very nervous. Some worry this consultant expenditure of \$80,000 is just a way for PARD to recommend "objectively" that the House and remains of the once elegant grounds be demolished. Others are confident that the opposite is the case, and that a solid case for restoration will float to the top of the consultants' recommendations and findings. With such a recommendation, PARD can confidently go to Council to request funding to put the recommendations in place. Demolition might come out as the cheapest option, but not a politically acceptable one since City Council members have all given their verbal support for the project to Posse members when they met with them. IF, however, the Posse sees the Study heading in this direction, its members will be vigilant in getting the word out to you.

Planning & Zoning Variance Process Passes Oct 4, 2010

The following document is designed to help all SRCC members understand the variance process, and when the occasion arises, expedite all suitable zoning variance requests in a consistent and orderly manner.

SOUTH RIVER CITY CITIZENS NEIGHBORHOOD ASSOCIATION (SRCC) VARIANCE REVIEW POLICY & PROCESS APPROVED 10/4/2010

A. PRELIMINARY ASSESSMENT

- APPLICANT (one seeking OR considering a variance) contacts the SRCC Zoning & Planning Committee (ZPC) co-chairs, Jean Mather 444-4153 or Teresa Griffin 444-6914, to discuss the variance request. As needed, ZPC may schedule a meeting with APPLICANT, possibly on site, and may invite potentially impacted neighbors to expedite understanding of variance request. APPLICANT must bring to the meeting, copies of relevant information, including, as appropriate, variance application, relevant calculations, site plan, photos of APPLICANT'S property and photos of adjacent property.
- ZPC will provide APPLICANT with a copy of this Variance Review Policy & Process with the attached City
 of Austin Land Development Code Variance Requirements (LDC 25-2-471 through 25-2-474) prior to this
 meeting.
- 3. ZPC advises APPLICANT of its recommendation to be taken to the neighborhood organization, if a formal variance application moves forward.
- B. NEIGHBORHOOD RECOMMENDATION
 - If APPLICANT decides to move forward with a formal variance application, APPLICANT should inform ZPC. The City will send SRCC a notification of the application, the case number, and the date of the appropriate City Board or Commission hearing. If time allows, SRCC will put the case on the agenda of the next regularly scheduled monthly General Membership meeting (1st Monday). If there is not a regular SRCC meeting prior to the APPLICANT'S scheduled Board or Commission hearing, the ZPC and President may take several actions:
 - a. Schedule the case for the next scheduled SRCC Executive Committee meeting (every 3rd Monday)
 - b. Request the SRCC Executive Committee to review and vote on the case via email
 - c. Request a postponement of the hearing date by the reviewing Board or Commission until after SRCC's next regular meeting.
 - If the variance application is to be considered at SRCC's regular monthly membership meeting, it will have a place on the agenda, which is posted on the <u>SouthRiverAustin@yahoogroups.com</u> list serve approximately one week prior to the meeting date.
 - 3. Procedural review at the SRCC meeting will be as follows:
 - a. ZPC makes succinct presentation of the variance request and findings (3 minutes max.)
 - b. APPLICANT may add comments (3 minutes max.)
 - c. ZPC makes a motion. Followed by a second to the motion, ZPC guides discussion and Q&A. (3 minutes max.)
 - d. ZPC restates the motion with amendments, as appropriate.
 - e. SRCC leads the vote of eligible members.

C. NOTIFICATION

- 1. ZPC prepares draft letter to appropriate Board or Commission reporting SRCC's vote on the variance request, and sends to SRCC President.
- 2. President sends final letter to appropriate Board or Commission with copies to the Executive Committee and ZPC co-chairs.
- 3. ZPC makes arrangements to have SRCC attendees at the Board or Commission hearing, as deemed necessary.

SRCC's policy is to follow the City's regulations for reviewing variance requests, as found in the City of Austin Land Development Code, Section 25-2-471 through 25-2-474 as shown below:

"SUBCHAPTER C. USE AND DEVELOPMENT REGULATIONS.

ARTICLE 1. GENERAL PROVISIONS.

§ 25-2-471 INTERPRETATION GUIDELINES.

The Planning Commission may, by resolution, adopt guidelines for the interpretation by the building official of yard and setback requirements in instances where geometric shape, dimensions, or topography make the literal interpretation of the requirements impractical.

§ 25-2-472 BOARD OF ADJUSTMENT VARIANCE AUTHORITY.

The Board of Adjustment shall hear and decide a request for a variance from a requirement of this chapter, except as otherwise provided by the Code.

§ 25-2-473 VARIANCE REQUIREMENTS.

- (A) A variance from the requirements of this chapter may be granted under this division if, because of special circumstances of a property, the strict application of this chapter deprives the property owner of privileges that are enjoyed by another person who owns property in the area that has the same zoning designation as the property for which the variance is requested.
- (B) A variance to a regulation may not grant special privileges that are inconsistent with the limitations on other properties in the area or on the district in which the property is located.

§ 25-2-474 REQUIRED FINDINGS.

- (A) The Board of Adjustment may grant a variance from a requirement if it determines that:
 - (1) the requirement does not allow for a reasonable use of property;
 - (2) the hardship for which the variance is requested is unique to the property and is not generally characteristic of the area in which the property is located; and
 - (3) development under the variance does not:
 - (a) alter the character of the area adjacent to the property;
 - (b) impair the use of adjacent property that is developed in compliance with the City requirements; or
 - (c) impair the purposes of the regulations of the zoning district in which the property is located.
- (B) The Board may grant a variance from a loading facility or off-street parking if, in addition to the findings required by Subsection (A), the Board determines that:
 - (1) current or anticipated traffic volume generated by the use of the property or a nearby property does not reasonably require strict compliance with and enforcement of the requirement from which a variance is requested;
 - (2) development under the variance does not result in parking or loading on public streets that interferes with the free flow of traffic on the streets; and
 - (3) development under the variance does not create a safety hazard or any other condition that is inconsistent with the objectives of the Code.
- (C) A variance granted under Subsection (B) applies only to the use for which the variance was granted and does not run with the land on which the use is located.

South Congress Improvement Project (SCIP)

A City of Austin Capital Improvement Project

The City's main street leading to our state capital (and coincidentally the western border for SRCC), South Congress Avenue, has seen a lot of changes and structural improvements over the past eight years. While it seems that the wheels of city government turn slow, progress has been steady and produced a much more pedestrian-friendly environment for what is now a thriving commercial district.

A Brief History

- 1998 \$4 million funded by '98 Bond Election
- 2000 Put on hold pending Light Rail referendum
- 2002 City partnered with Texas School for Deaf to build retaining wall and streetscape improvements along School frontage, including additional public parking
- 2003 Lighting study completed, included location of all underground utilities; merchants rejected lighting plan
- 2004 Potential project list generated for Feasibility Study
- 2005 Feasibility Study begun
- 2006 S Congress re-striped for better mobility
- 2007 Feasibility Study completed

2007- Present

A series of community meetings were held, followed by design and construction of improvements. Examples include:

- (A) Pedestrian crossing improvement trials, several locations
- (B) Improved sidewalk along Guero's courtyard
- (C) Retaining wall and sidewalk north of Homeslice Pizza, in front of two historic homes, to replace dangerous and worn footpath
- (D) Improved side street crossings with bulb-outs at James and Elizabeth Streets

Pending Activity

In 2010 the City surveyed businesses and residents on either side of S. Congress to learn about parking and traffic opinions. Some of the results were (A) 65.5% in favor of parking on one side only of narrow side streets, (B) 61.8% said Residential Parking Permits would help, (C) 65.7% in favor of back-in angle parking.

2010 Potential Future Improvements

The City is holding community meetings on its plans for spending the remaining funds between Academy Drive and Leland Avenue, to include:

- (A) New traffic signals at James and Gibson Streets
- (B) Crosswalks at every intersection
- (C) Bulb-outs for safer crossings at lights
- (D) Back-in angle parking for a net gain of 100 additional spaces
- (E) Improved bike lanes, and (F) reduced number of bus stops

There are other smaller improvements as well. We encourage SRCC residents to participate in the ongoing public input sessions held by the City for prioritizing expenditure of the remaining SCIP funds.
